

#### Background (1/2) What is sexual positioning?

- Sexual positioning = Behavior
  - History of specific behavioral positions (e.g., receptive anal sex, insertive anal sex, both, neither)
  - Beyond just asking about history of anal/oral/vaginal sex
- Sexual role = *Identity*
  - Identify as a top, bottom, versatile, or none of these
- Can be defined based on anal, oral, or vaginal sex history, separately, or jointly.
- Depends on temporal scale (e.g., behavior in the past year or lifetime)

#### Background (2/2)

Individual and population level effects of sexual positioning (a simplification)



#### Objective

- 1) Describe frequency of sexual positioning categories
- Describe associations of sexual positioning with demographics and number of partners in past year
- 3) Describe network overlap among sexual positioning categories

#### Conclusions

- 1) Anal versatility among MSM is not ubiquitous
  - Among MSM who have had sex with another man in the past year, only 46% of reported anal versatility in the past year)

- 2) Sexual positioning frequency is similar across many dimensions: (age, race, poverty, incarceration, or metropolitan status)
- Though frequency does differ across other dimensions: (education and male and female annual partner number)
- 3) Same sex and opposite sex networks overlap among men who have had sex with other men in the past year:
  - >38% reported partners of both sexes in the past year

#### Methods (1/2)


- National Survey of Family Growth (NSFG)
  - Nationally representative, multi-stage probability sample of men and women in the US Household population ages 15-44 years.
- NSFG oversamples non-Hispanic blacks, Hispanics, and adolescents.
- The survey consisted of an interviewer-administered and an audio computer-assisted self-interview (ACASI) portion.
- We combined data from the 2011-2013 and 2013-2015 cycles
  - 2011-2013 cycle: 4,815 male respondents (249 MSM)
  - 2013-2015 cycle: 4,506 male respondents (276 MSM)
- Analysis is limited to men who reported sex with another man in the past year

#### Methods (2/2) Analytic methods

- We define four mutually exclusive MSM types based on anal sex positioning history:
  - 1) Insertive—history of insertive sex but not receptive sex
  - 2) Receptive—history of receptive sex but not insertive sex
  - 3) Versatile—history of both receptive and insertive anal sex
  - 4) Oral-only—history of only oral sex (no history of anal sex with other men)
- This is estimated for sexually active MSM based on their annual behavioral history
- Complex survey design is taken into account using the R survey package
- We report significant differences where 95% confidence intervals do not overlap

Marginal distribution of sexual positioning types





#### Result (2/3) Associations (briefly)

- ➤ We found no associations lifetime sexual positioning and
  - Age
  - Race
  - Metropolitan status
  - Incarceration history
  - Poverty index
- ➤ We found significant associations between sexual positioning and
  - Education:
    - College educated MSM more frequently reported versatility than those with less than high school education
  - Male partners in past year:
    - Versatility more frequent with more annual male partners
    - · Oral-sex only more frequent with fewer annual male partners
  - Female partners in past year:
    - Versatility more frequent with fewer annual female partners
    - Oral-sex only more frequent with more annual female partners


Network overlan in nast vear


Result (3/3) Network overlap in past year (limited to active MSM)

#### **Conclusions**

#### Conclusions

- 1) Anal versatility among MSM is not ubiquitous
  - Among MSM who have had sex with another man in the past year, only 46% of reported anal versatility in the past year)
- 2) Sexual positioning frequency is similar across many dimensions: (age, race, poverty, incarceration, or metropolitan status)
- Though frequency does differ across other dimensions: (education and male and female annual partner number)
- 3) Same sex and opposite sex networks overlap among men who have had sex with other men in the past year:
  - ▶38% reported partners of both sexes in the past year

#### **Future Directions**

- While versatility was associated with fewer female partners and oral-sex only was associated with more female partners, there was still ample anal sex overlap in the form of men who have both male and female partners annually.
- Due to the observed overlap between MSM and heterosexual networks, this begs the question, how distinct are MSM and heterosexual networks in terms of transmission of HIV, syphilis, and gonorrhea?

 Future theoretical work is needed to define critical thresholds of bisexual bridging for specific pathogens, taking into account sexual positioning behavior.


#### Result (1/3)

➤ The frequency of versatility (and all other sexual positioning categories) depends on the temporal scope used.


VERSATILITY (95% CI)	Based on lifetime history	Based on annual history
Among all MSM	37% (31-42%)	23% (19-27%)
Among annually active MSM	61% (52-69%)	46% (38-54%)


> Versatility is not ubiquitous, regardless of the temporal scope used.

# Result (1/3) Marginal distribution of sexual positioning types






Male sex partners last year


Anal positioning with men Versatile Insertive Receptive Oral sex only


